## A. STUDY CHAPTER 1 VOCABULARY

Directions: In order to study this vocabulary, copy down all of these words and definitions into your notebook. Title this page "The Call of the Wild Chapter I Vocabulary". I know there are a lot of words, but it's going to help you understand the reading. You don't have to copy down the things that I wrote in parenthesis.

- 1. *Imperious* (adj) arrogant, domineering, overbearing, commanding, *dictatorial*.
- 2. *Sate* (v) to satisfy an appetite fully. To provide someone with more than enough.
- 3. *Egoistic* (adj) self-obsessed, conceited, vain, self-important. (Someone who is *egoistic* has an inflated idea of their own importance. Remember, "ego" means "I" in Latin.)
- 4. *Insular* (adj) isolated, detached, alone. (Remember, "insula" means "island" in Latin. Something that's *insular* is like an island—it's all alone, cut off from everything else.)
- 5. *Progeny* (n) offspring, children, descendent. (E.g. ("e.g." means "for example"): You are your parent's progeny.)
- 6. Lacerate (v) to rip, cut, tear, wound; to mangle
- 7. Detestable (adj) hateful, abominable, odious
- 8. *Inflammation* (n) something that's set on fire; when skin gets red, infected, swells, get irritated



- 9. *Metamorphose* (v) to change into a wholly different form or appearance; to transform
- 10. Soliloquize (v) to talk to yourself thoughtfully, to think over something out loud
- 11. *Latent* (adj) hidden, concealed, not yet visible or apparent, not yet manifested, sleeping
- 12. Weazened (adj) dried up, wrinkly, shriveled (Think of a raisin. A raisin is a weazened grape. "Weazened" is sometimes spelled "wizened".)
- 13. Swarthy (adj) dark, tawny, having a dark complexion, dark-skinned
- 14. Morose (adj) sullen, melancholy, gloomy, sulky
- 15. *Pervade* (v) to spread throughout (E.g.: Excitement *pervaded* the whole school on the last day before summer.)

### B. READ CHAPTER 1

Directions: Read chapter one. If it's at all possible, print off the whole book so you can annotate it as you read. I will not be checking for annotations, but I still encourage you to markup important passages. (It is also easier to focus when you're reading off of paper rather than a screen.)

As you read, keep your vocabulary words next to you.

Completely read the chapter **and then** complete the questions. I strongly encourage you to do reading **before** you read the questions.



## C. ANSWER THE CHAPTER 1 READING QUESTIONS (IN YOUR NOTEBOOK)

Directions: Title the next page in your notebook, "The Call of the Wild Chapter 2 Reading Questions," and then write your answers down there.

- 1. Where does the story begin? Use textual evidence to describe the setting? What's this place *like*? What is the date? (Notice: Buck lives in the Southlands. He is shipped off to the Arctic Northlands.)
  - Notice: On page 4, it says, "And this was the manner of dog Buck in fall of 1897, when the Klondike strike dragged men from all the world into the frozen North. The "Klondike strike" is the "Klondike Gold Rush," the discovery of gold in the Yukon and Klondike rivers (in Alaska and Canada). After gold was discovered there, loads of prospectors went North to freezing Alaska and Canada to look for gold. Many people sailed from San Francisco, California and Seattle, Washington to Dawson, Canada. This was a huge event at the time. If you would like, look up some pictures of the "Klondike Gold Rush."
- 2. Explain who Manuel is, what he does to Buck, and why.
- 3. Halfway down page 5, the person who is taking Buck to San Francisco lies to the baggageman. What is his lie? Why does he lie?
- 4. What's happened to this man's hand?
- 5. Where is this man really taking Buck?
- 6. (6) Use text to describe how Buck is reacting to the people around him. Look back at the first two pages of the book. How did Buck behave at the beginning, when he lived at home?
- 7. (top of 7) Why doesn't Buck eat for two days?
- 8. (7) What does the man with the red sweater do to Buck? Why?
- 9. (8) What does Buck learn from this experience. Use textual evidence.
- 10. (9) Who is Perrault? Who is François?
- 11. Buck meets three new dogs: Curly, Spitzbergen (also known as Spitz), and Dave. What are these three dogs like? (Use textual evidence.)

- (3) Connect Evidence to Your Claim (3a) Analysis (3b) Synthesis—4-6 sentences
- (4) Conclude the Claim (restate your claim, but don't just copy it)—1 sentence
