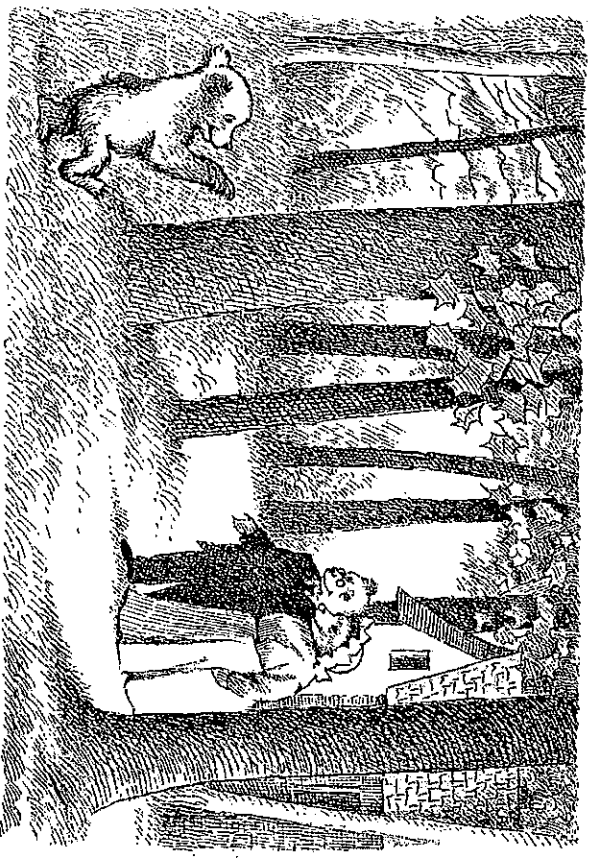




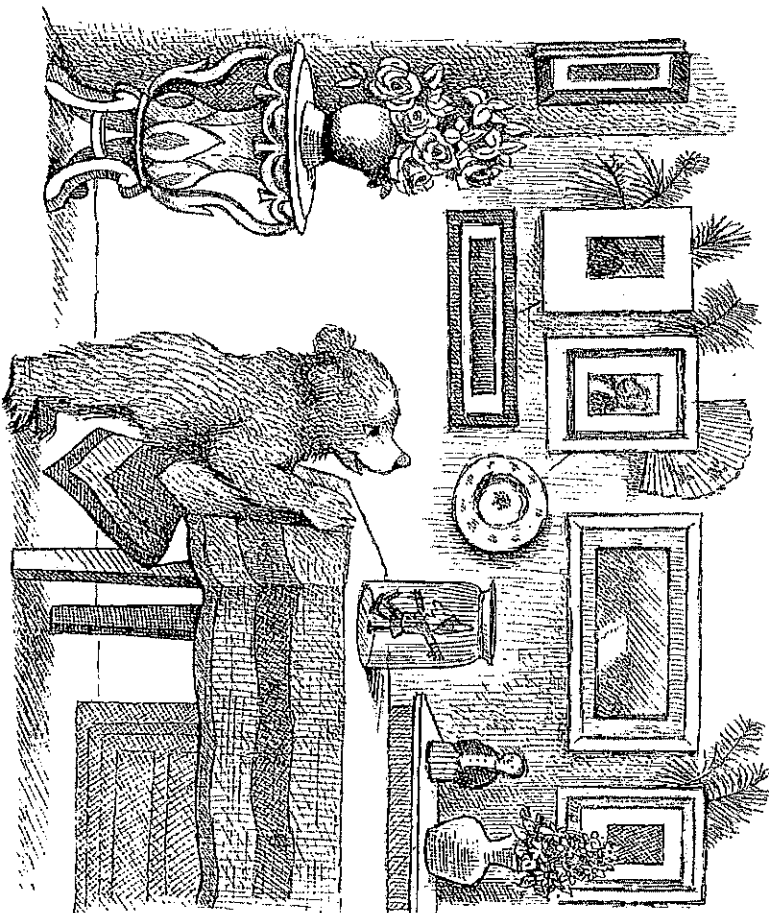
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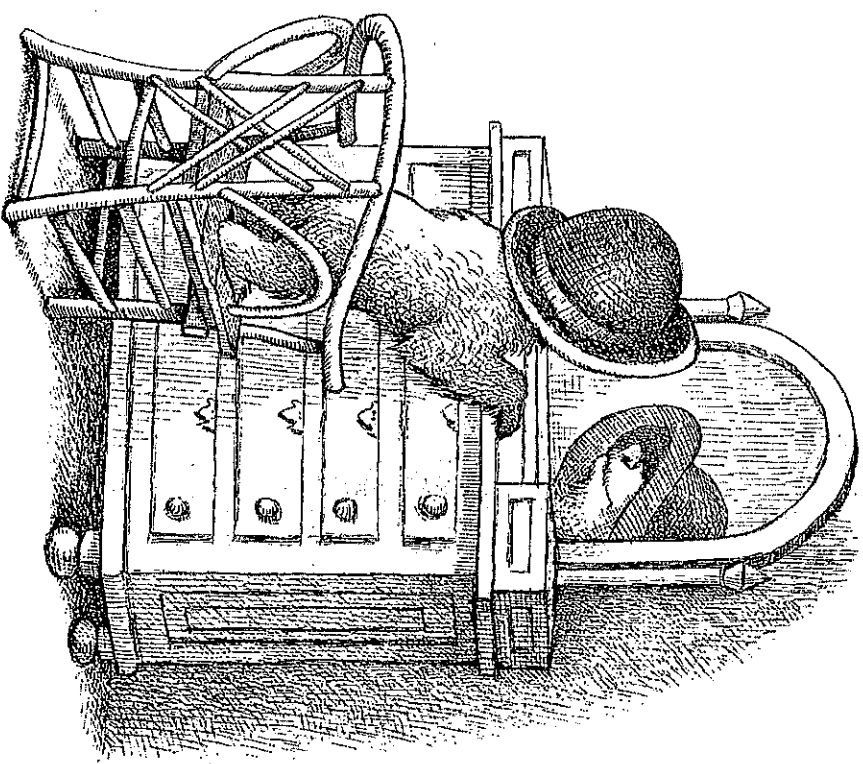
GRANDMOTHER AND GRANDFATHER BEAR



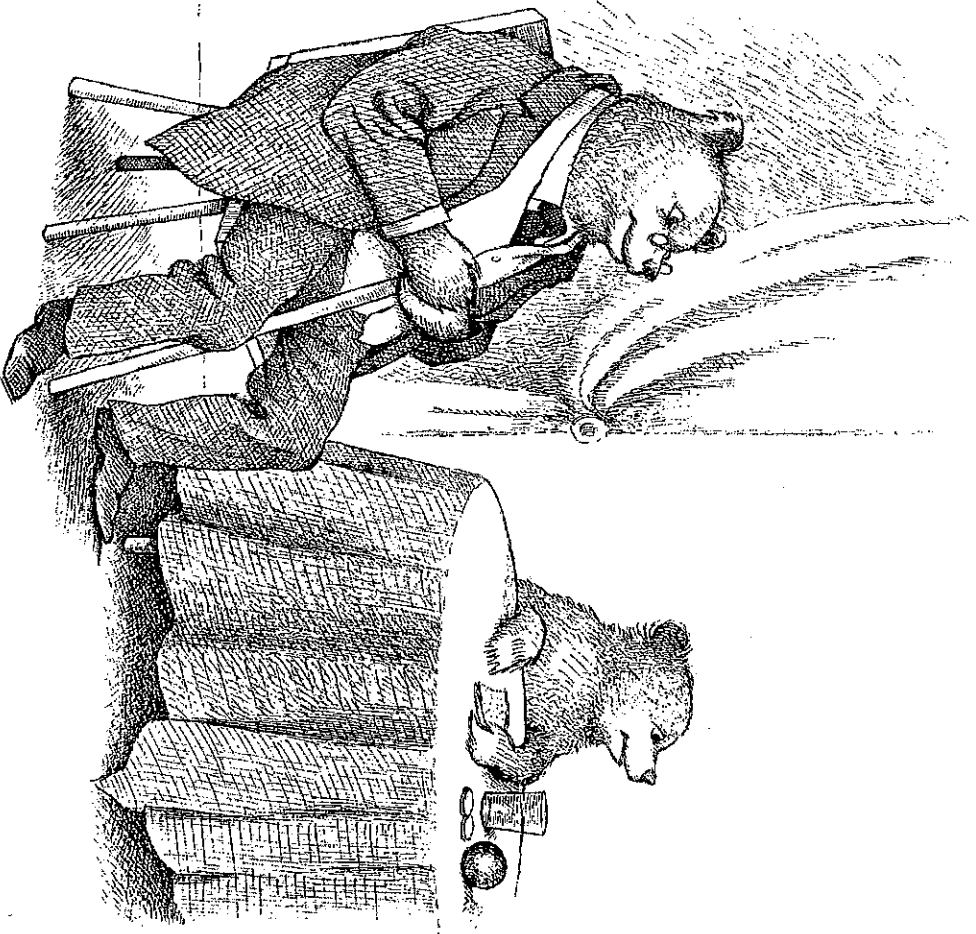
One day Little Bear came to visit

jumped up and down in a jar.

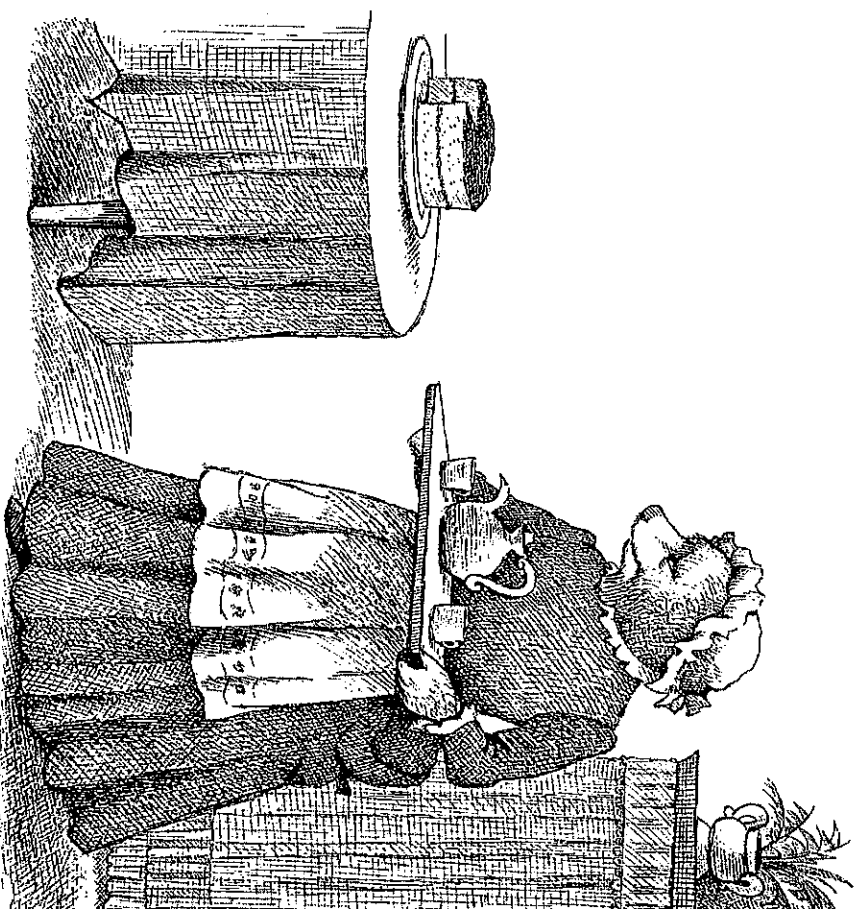


He liked to put on Grandfather's

and an apple.

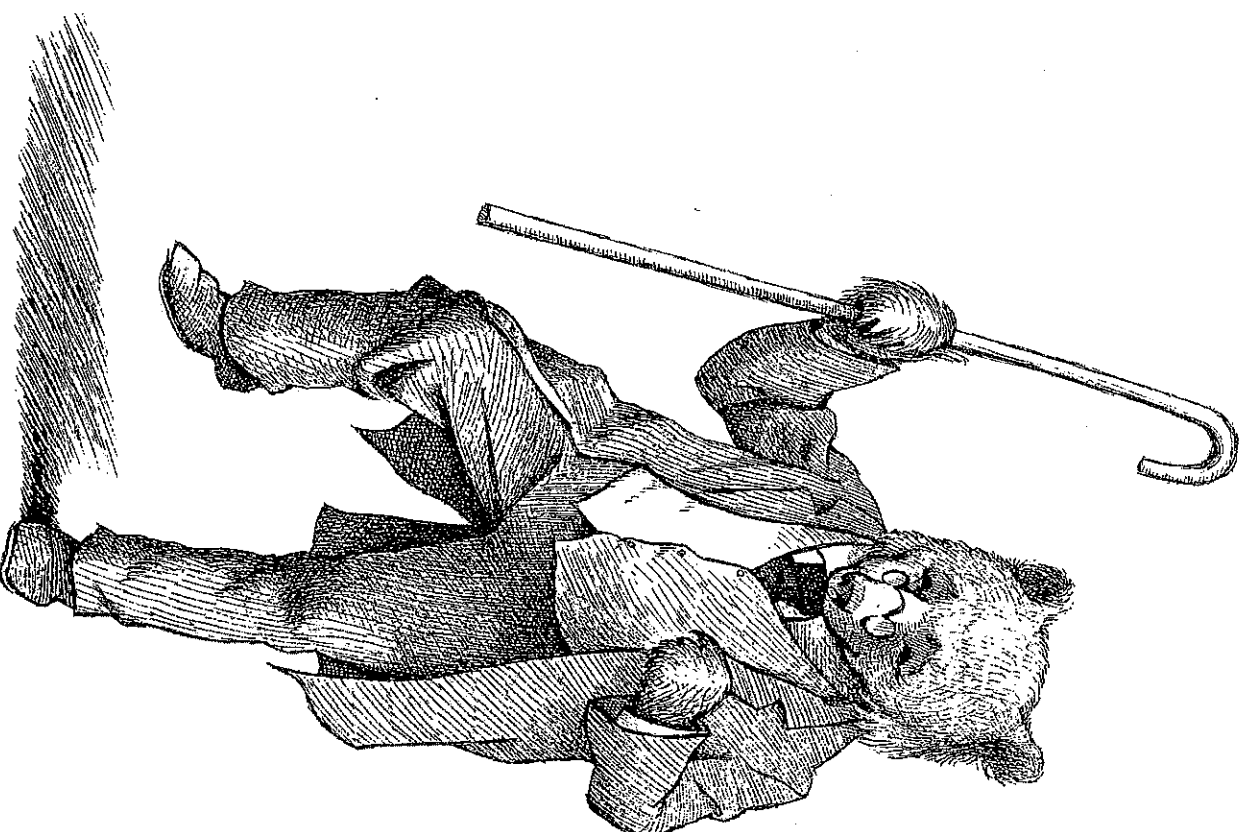

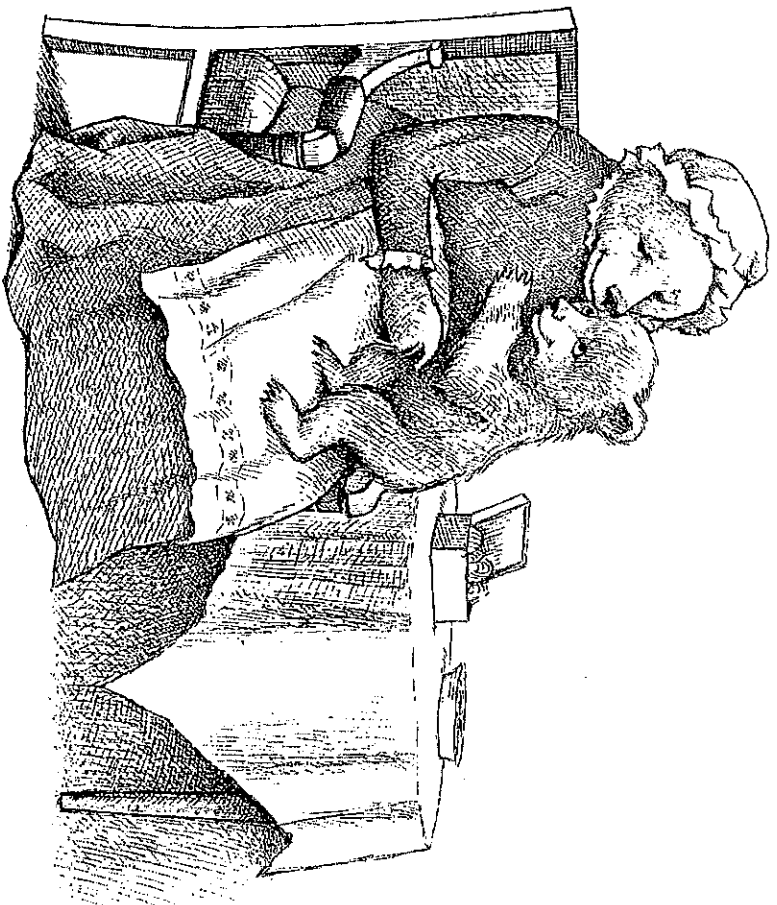


“Have some more,” said Grandmother.

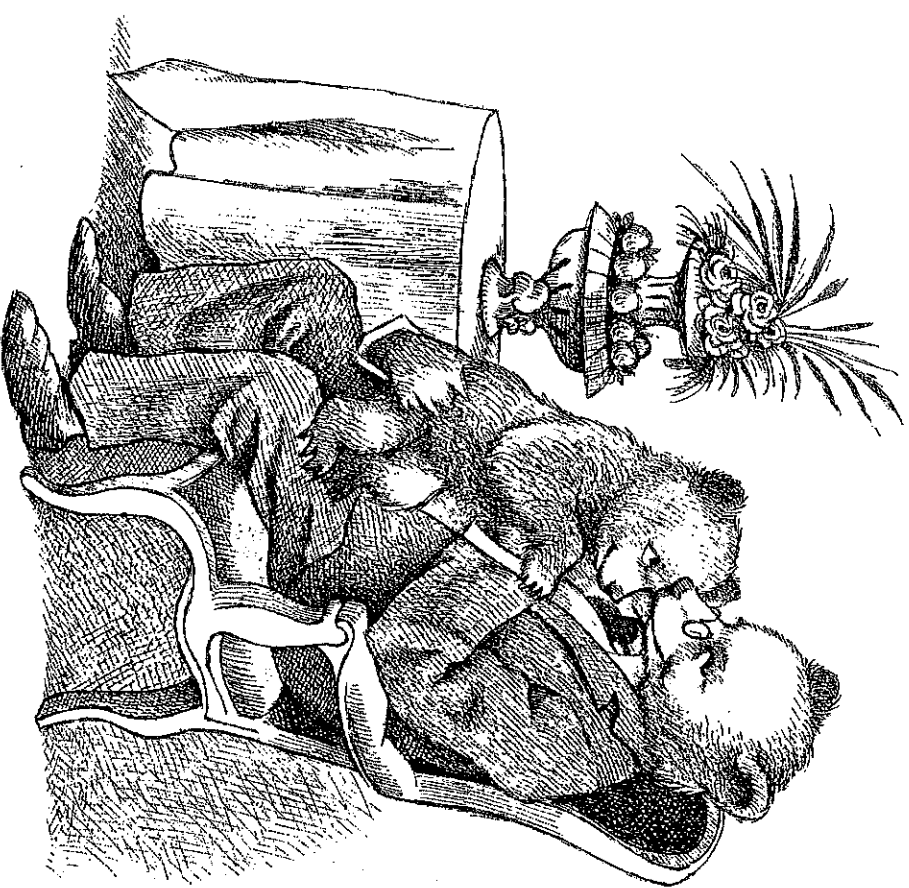
“Oh no, no!” said his grandmother.

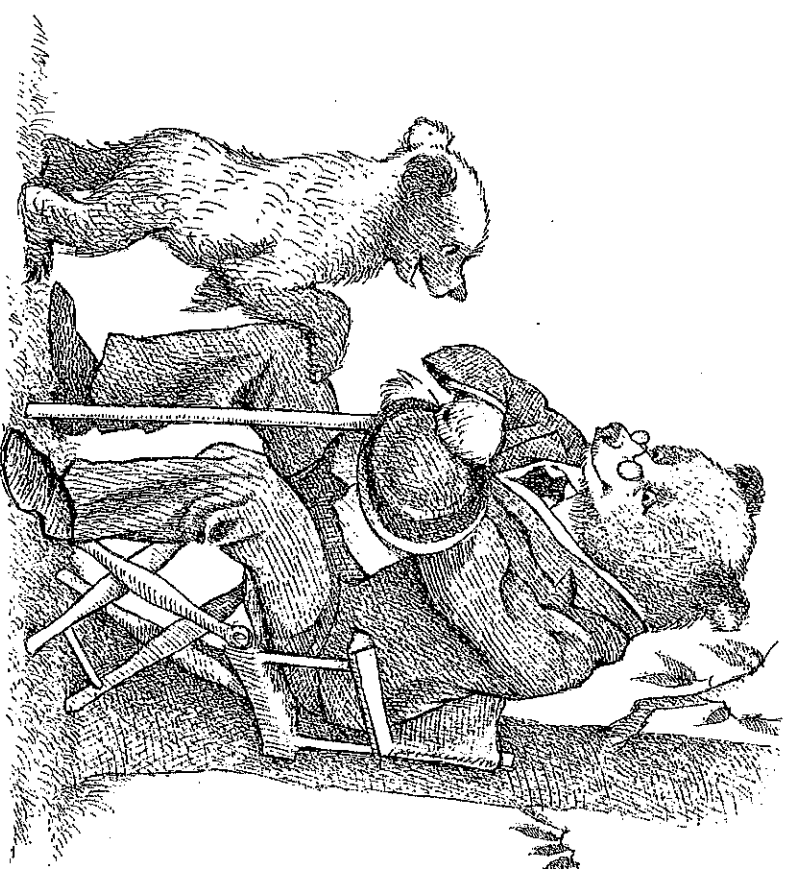


“What?” they asked.

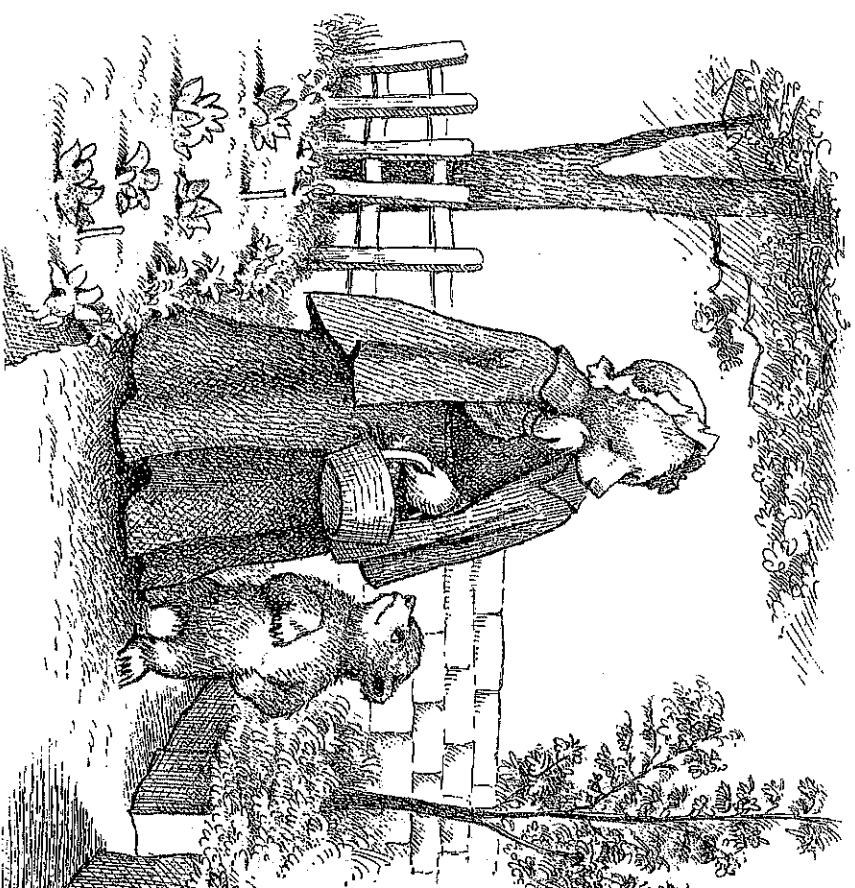
Little Bear and Grandfather

said Grandmother.

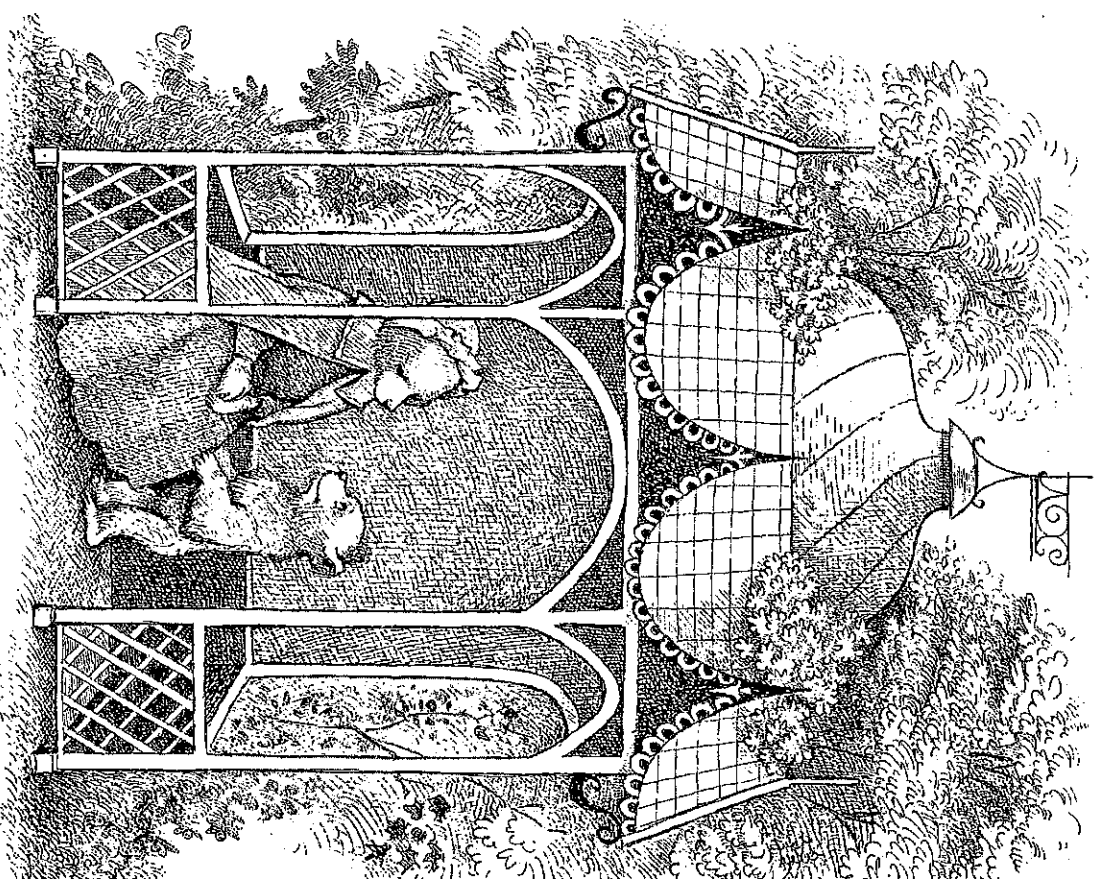
They sat down in the summer house.

From a Seed to a Sunflower

It may start out small, but it won't stay that way! Sunflowers are very tall flowers. They have beautiful heads that turn their faces toward the sun. They start their lives, though, buried in the dirt. They begin their lives as seeds.

Before a sunflower can grow, a sunflower seed must first be planted. A black and white striped seed has to be buried in the dirt. The seed needs lots of water. It needs sunlight, too. Then it can start to grow. First its roots will begin growing. They grow underground. Then a green shoot will make its way to the surface. Soon it will shoot up through the dirt. The shoot will grow taller and taller. It will grow leaves. It is turning into a sunflower. Next a bud will form at the top of the plant. Like the plant, the bud will get bigger and bigger. Then it opens! Tucked inside the bud is a beautiful round sunflower!



It might look like one flower, but the head of this sunflower actually contains many little flowers, or florets. The florets in the center of the head become sunflower seeds. These make the head heavy! In the fall, when the flower is done blooming, these seeds will fall to the ground. Some seeds will stay on the ground. Others will end up buried. Some will get carried off by birds and dropped in new places. Finally the sunflower cycle will repeat itself. And, in time, new tall flowers will grow from those old small seeds.

No, that was a bluebird's nest.

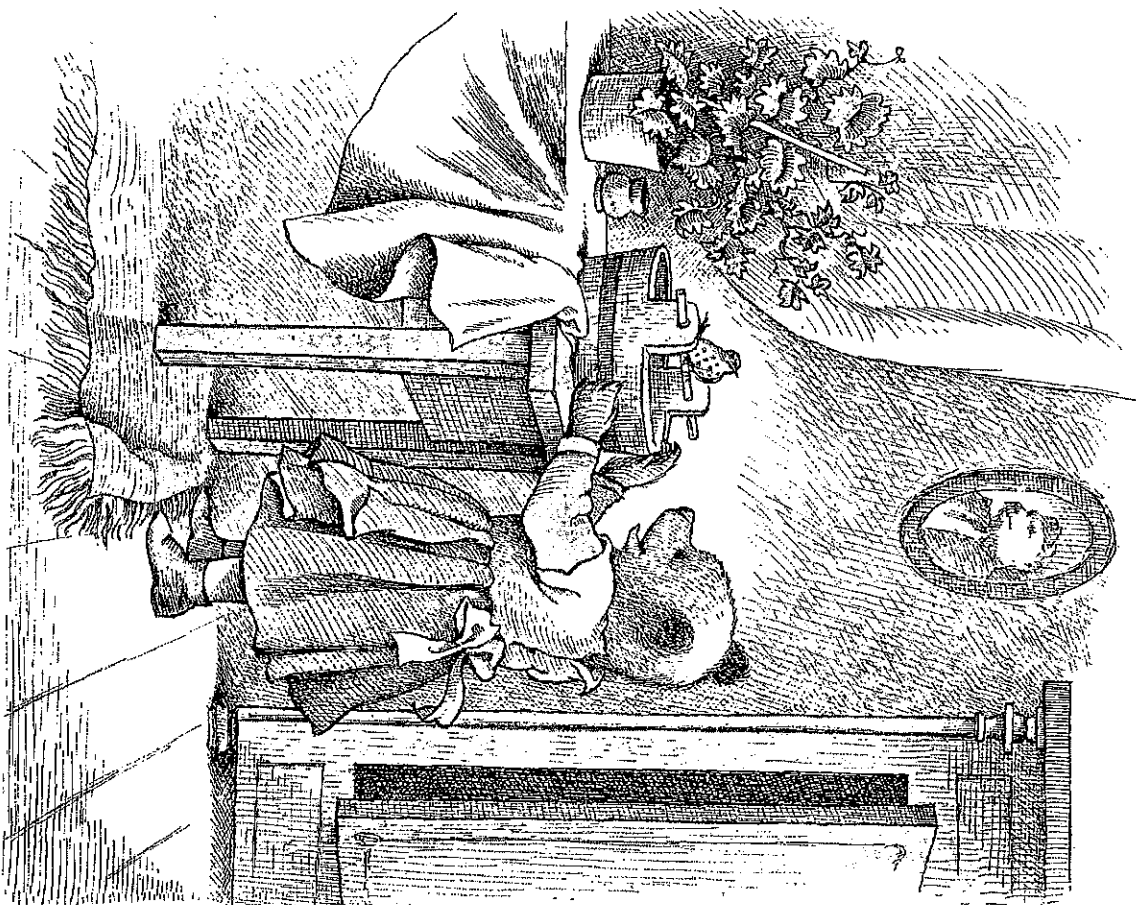
"Maybe it is over there,"

No, that was an oriole's nest.

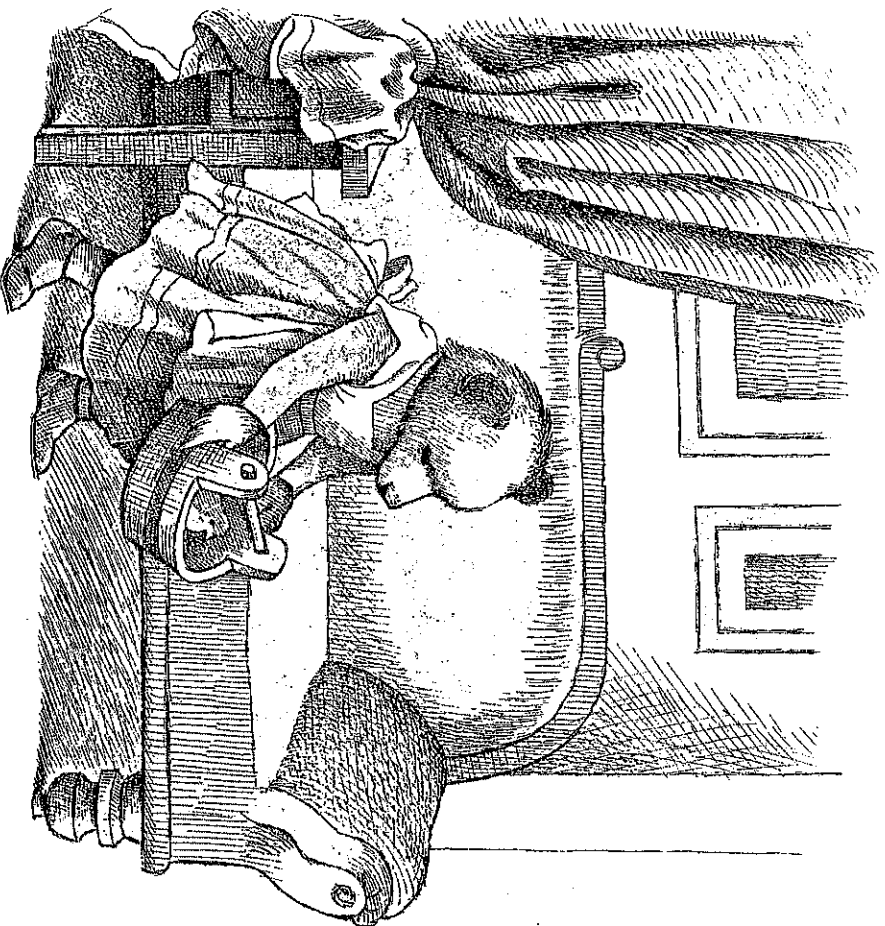
Mother Bear looked all over,

"You can be my robin."



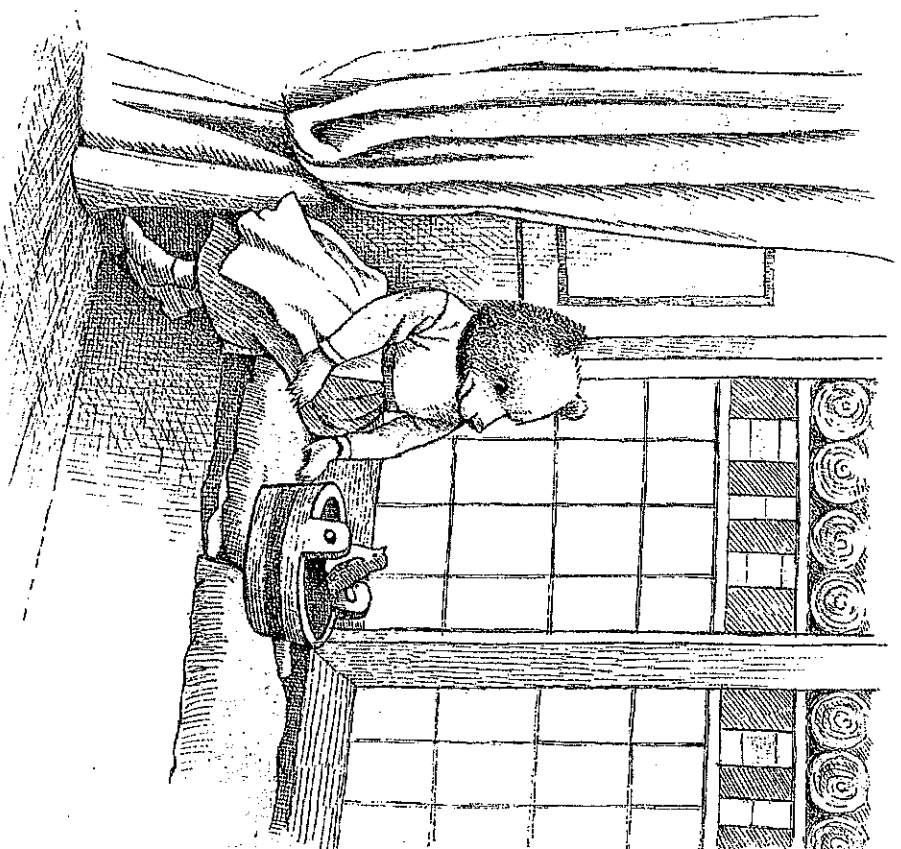
She took the robin in the house,

and the sky.”

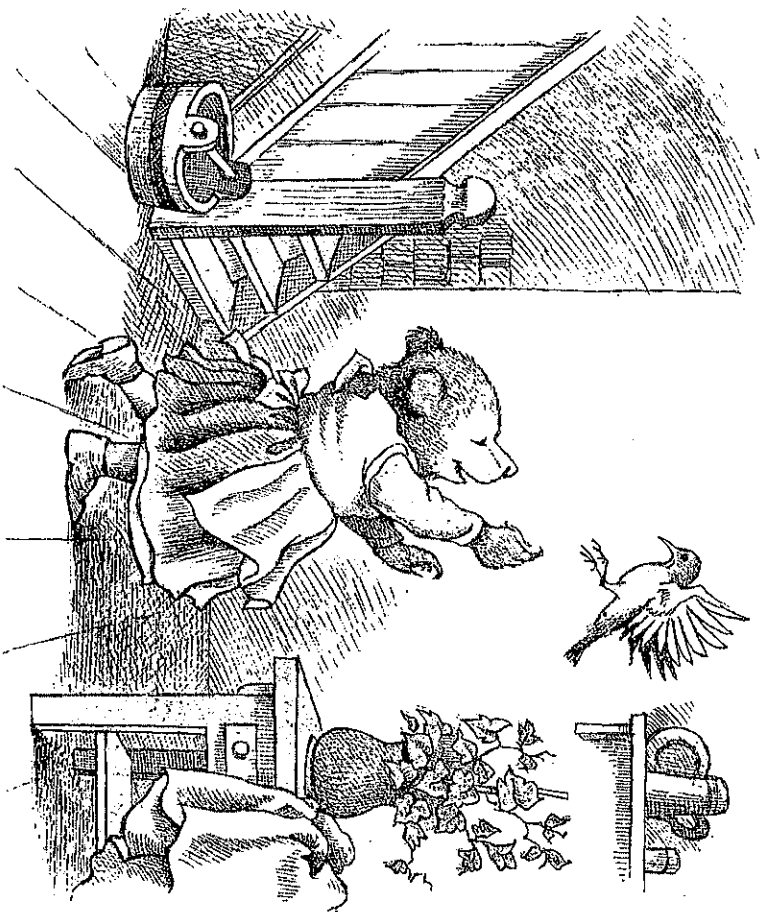


Mother Bear put it by the window.

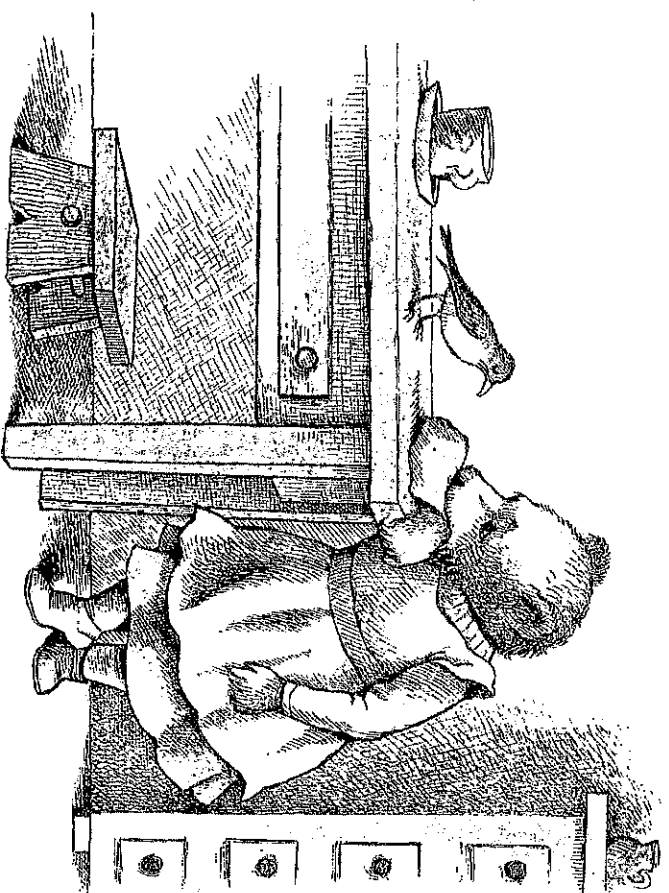
“Oh,” said the robin,

“it must be fun to fly out there.”

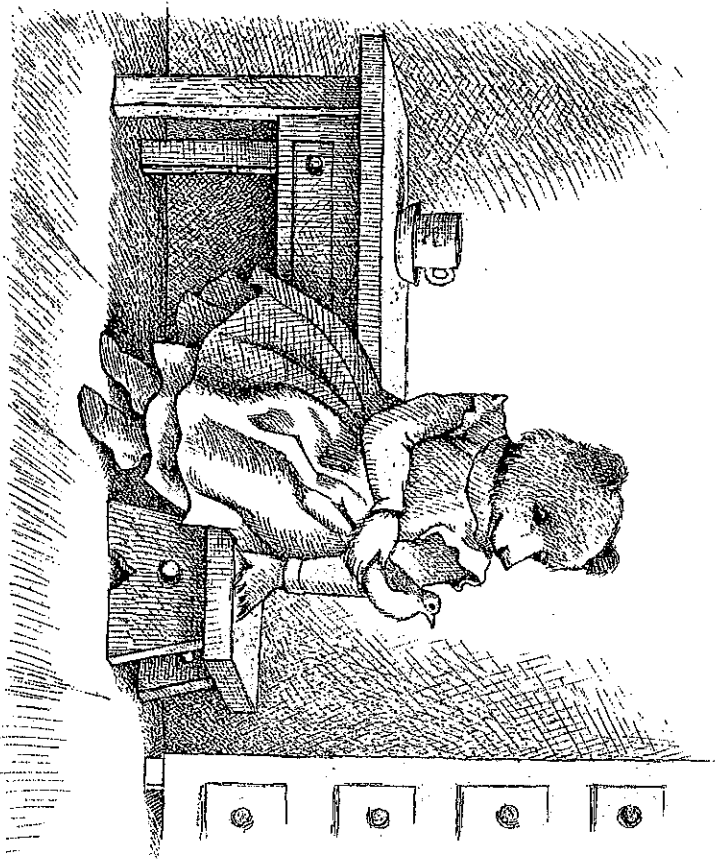
“It will be fun to fly in here,

“My heart is sad.”



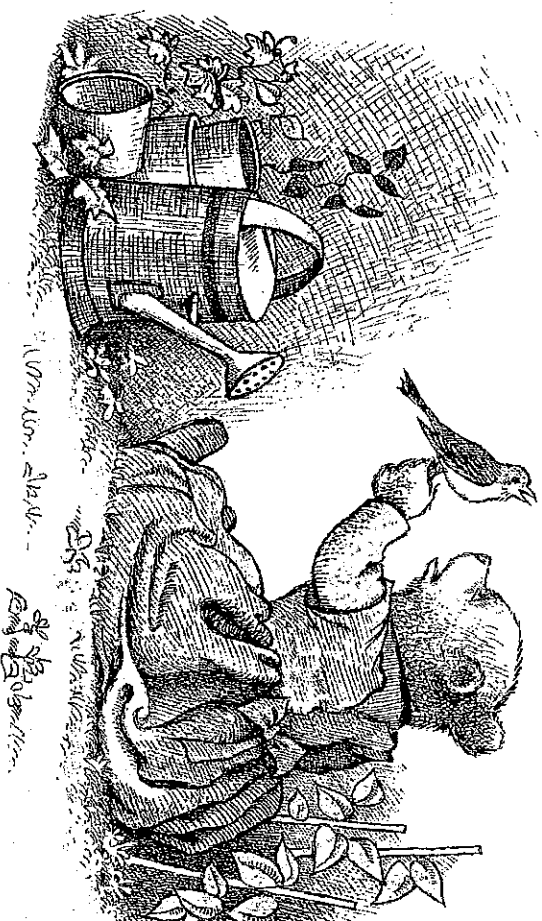
"Sing a song," said Mother Bear.

Mother Bear's eyes filled with tears.

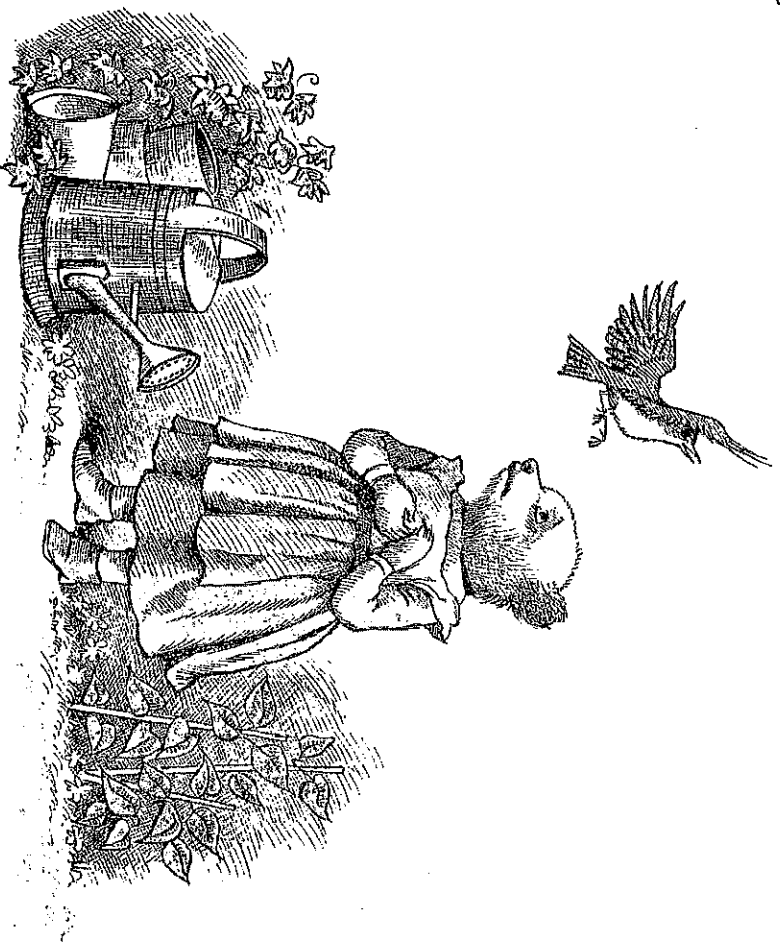
She took the robin out

Fly away, if you wish.

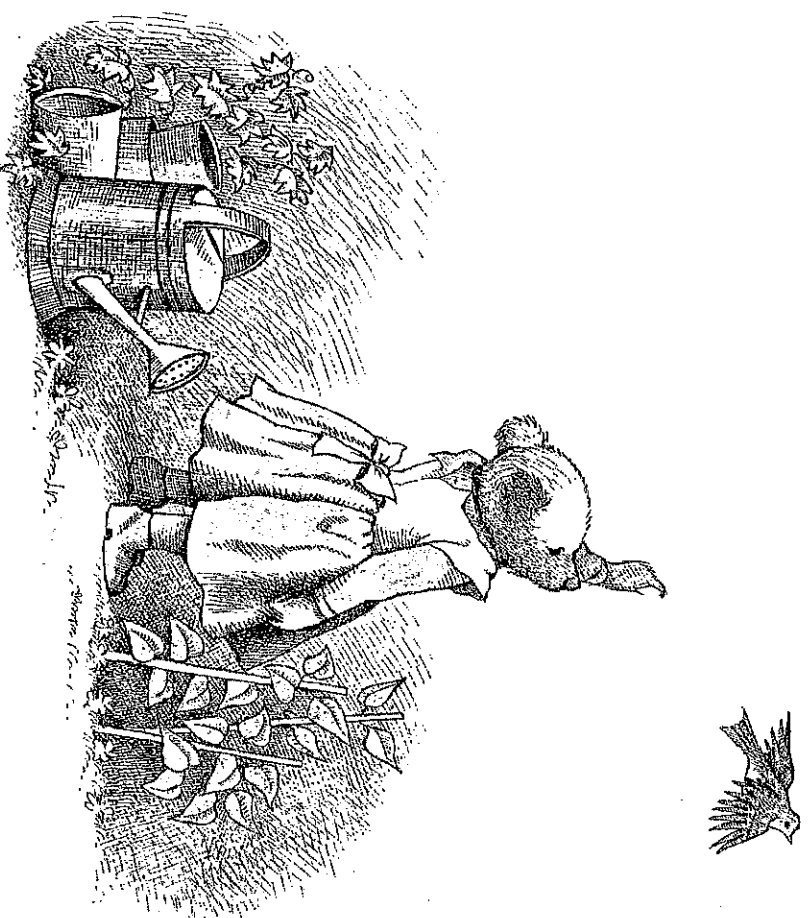
You are free."

right down to Mother Bear.

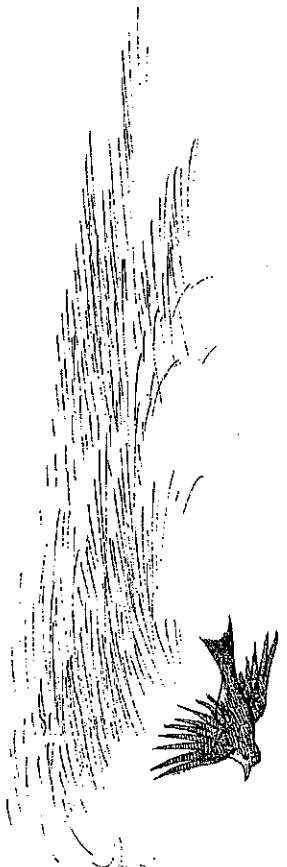


“Do not be sad,” said the robin.

It came back.

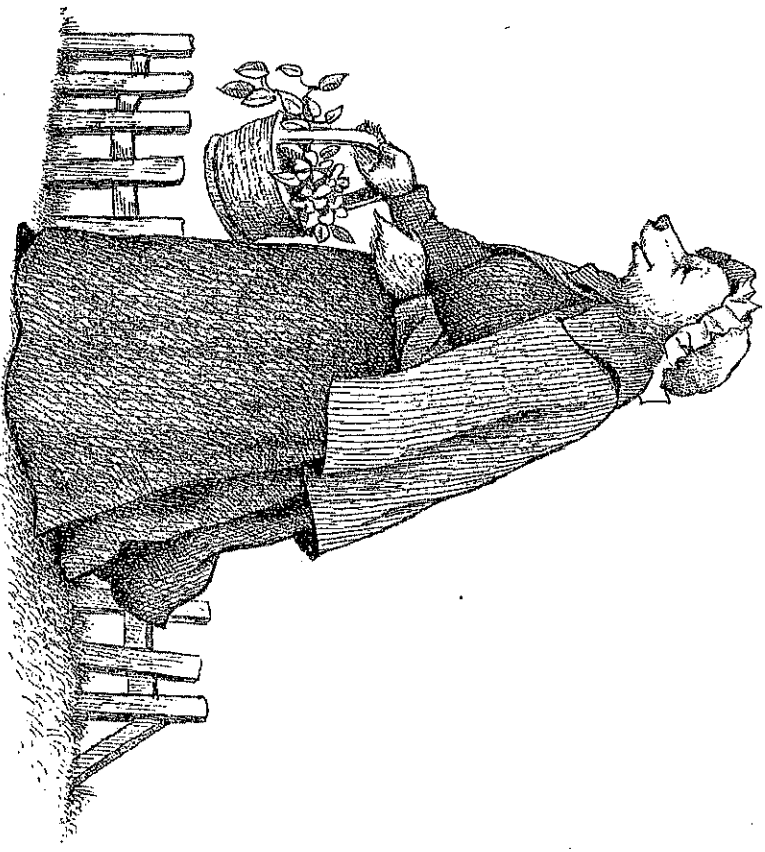
And its children came back.

said Grandfather.

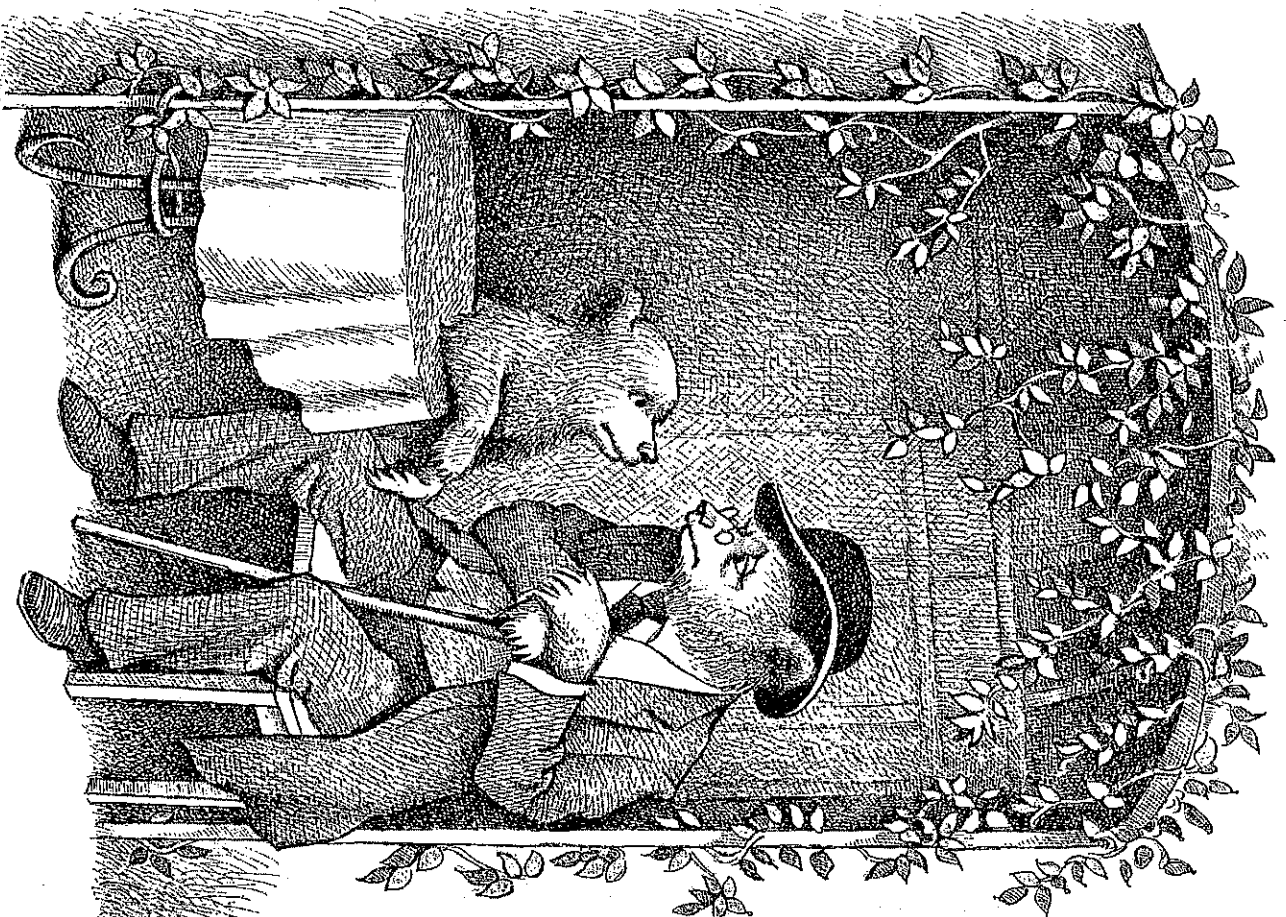
"I will not be scared,"

"But I may be scared."

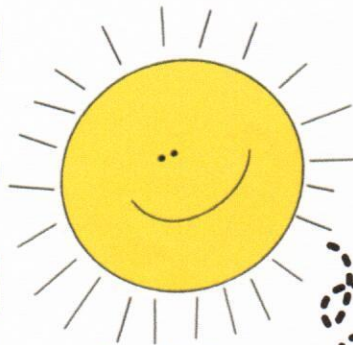
"Oh Grandfather!

So Grandfather began.

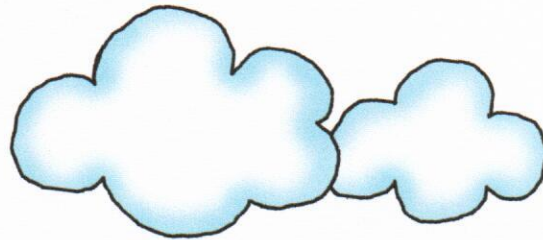


PHOTOSYNTHESIS

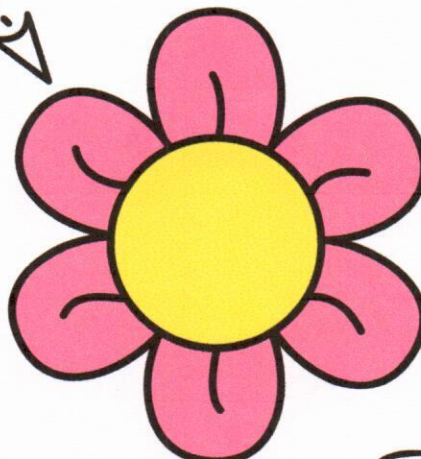
The process of a plant making its own food.
 $\text{Sunlight} + \text{Carbon Dioxide} + \text{Water} = \text{Sugar} + \text{Oxygen}$



Sunlight is absorbed into the plant.



Carbon dioxide is a gas that enters the plant through the pores in the leaves.



Oxygen is released into the atmosphere

Sugar (glucose) is made to feed the plant.

Rain is absorbed by the roots to help with photosynthesis.



Plants Make Food

A baby eats only milk. Cows eat grass. Birds eat bugs. You eat lots of different foods. Babies, cows, birds, and you need to eat food to get energy. Energy is needed to live and grow. Plants live and grow, too. But what do plants eat?



Plants can make their own food. How do they do it? They get energy from the sun's light. They use that energy, along with water and a gas from the air, to make their own food. This is called photosynthesis (foe toe SIN thuh sis).

Plants have something unique that lets them do photosynthesis. It's called chlorophyll (KLOR-uh-fill). Chlorophyll is a chemical. It gives plants their green color. Chlorophyll changes sunlight into chemical energy.

Plants need chlorophyll to make food. They need light from the sun. They also need water. Plants get water from the soil through their roots. Plants also need a gas from the air. They get carbon dioxide gas through tiny openings in their leaves. Inside the plant, carbon dioxide and water go through a chemical change. The water is split into oxygen and hydrogen. The hydrogen joins with the carbon dioxide. It makes a kind of sugar. The oxygen is not needed by the plant. It passes out of the tiny openings in the leaves. It

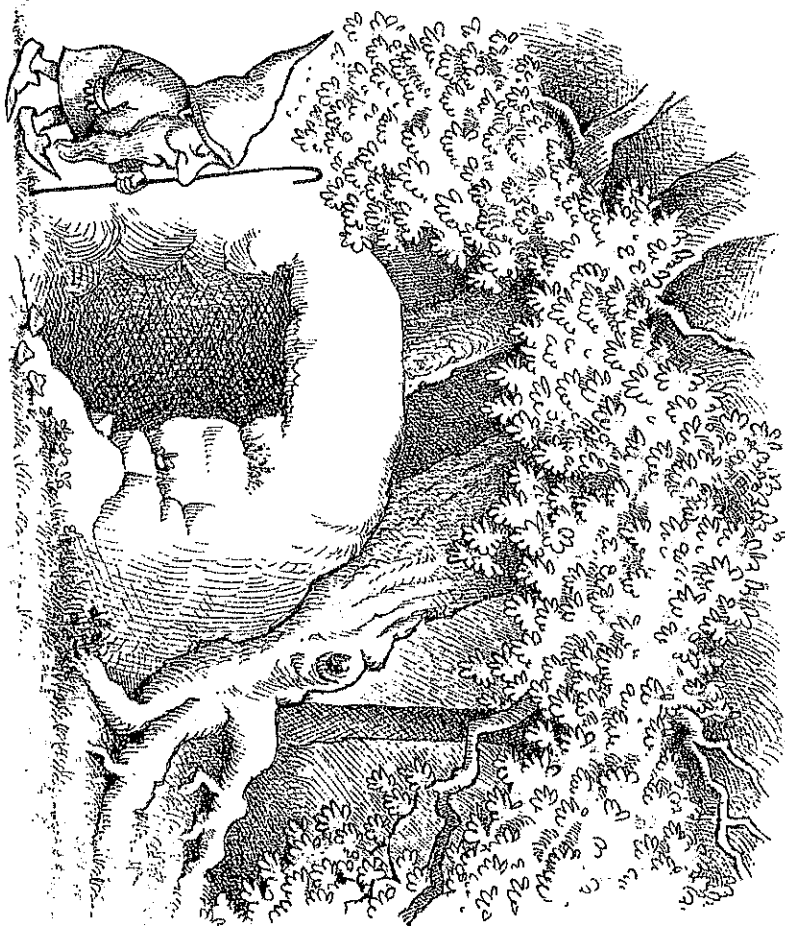

GOBLIN STORY



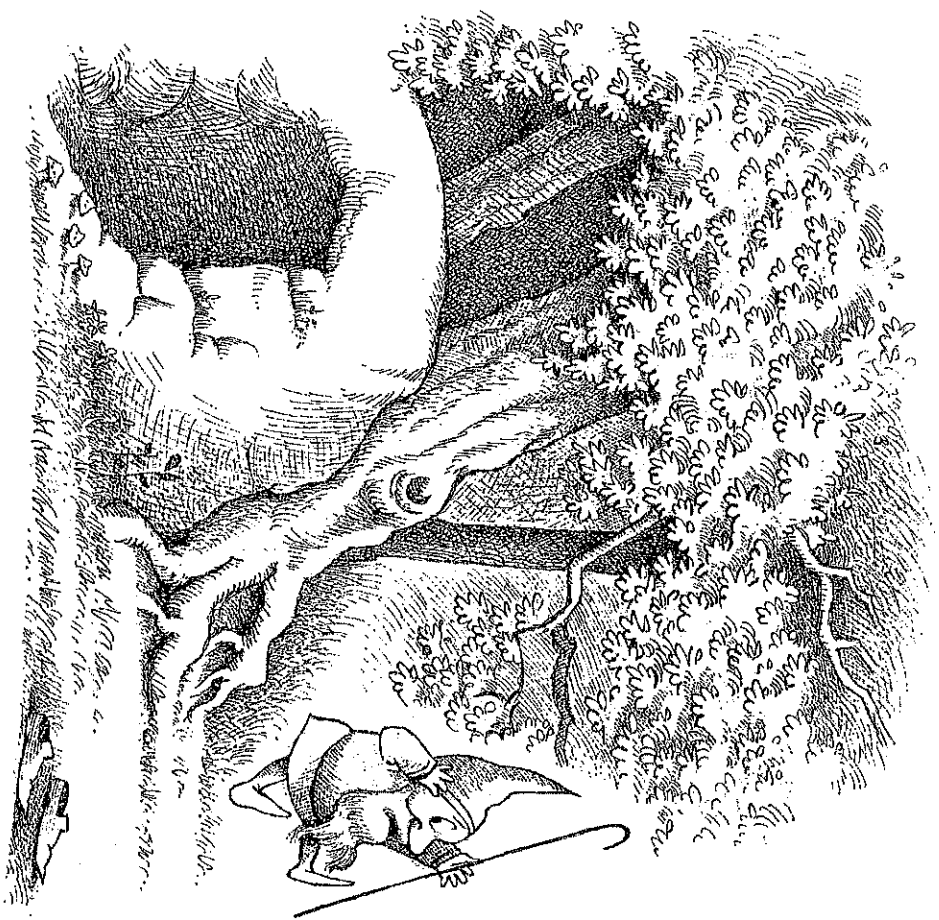
One day a little goblin

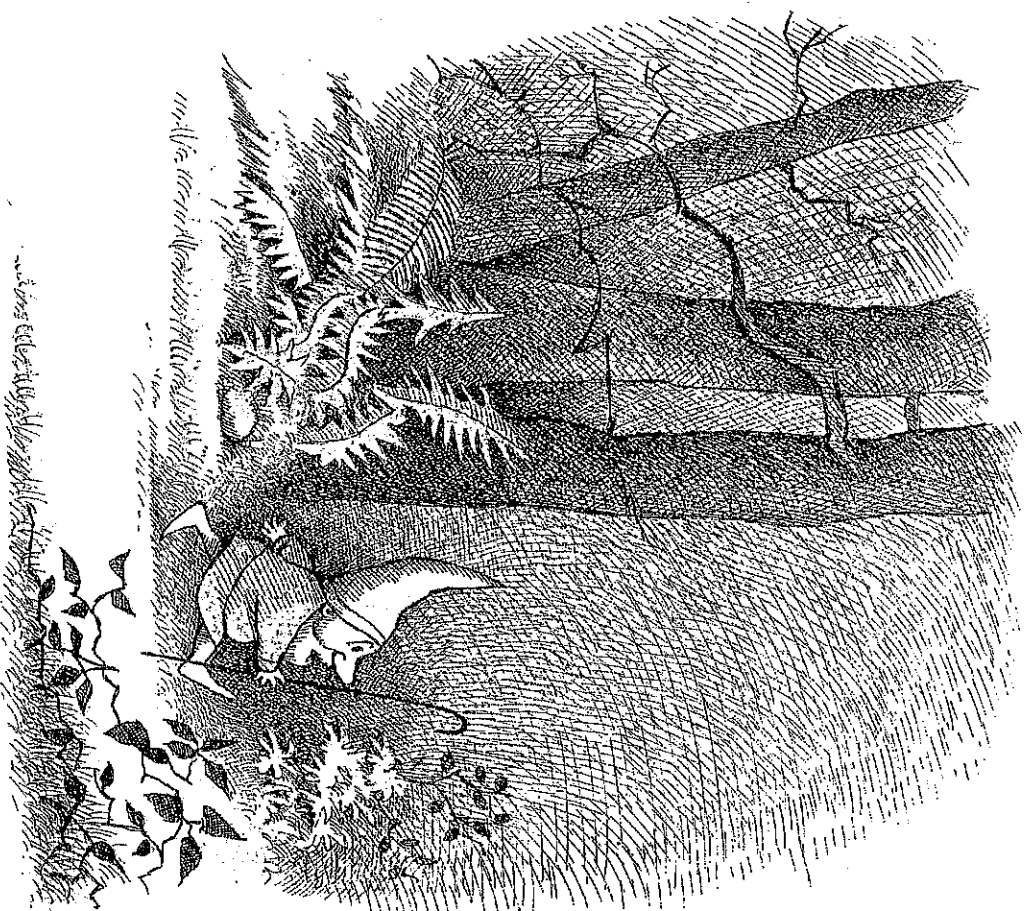


And something inside it went bump.

“Hoo-oooh—” cried the goblin.

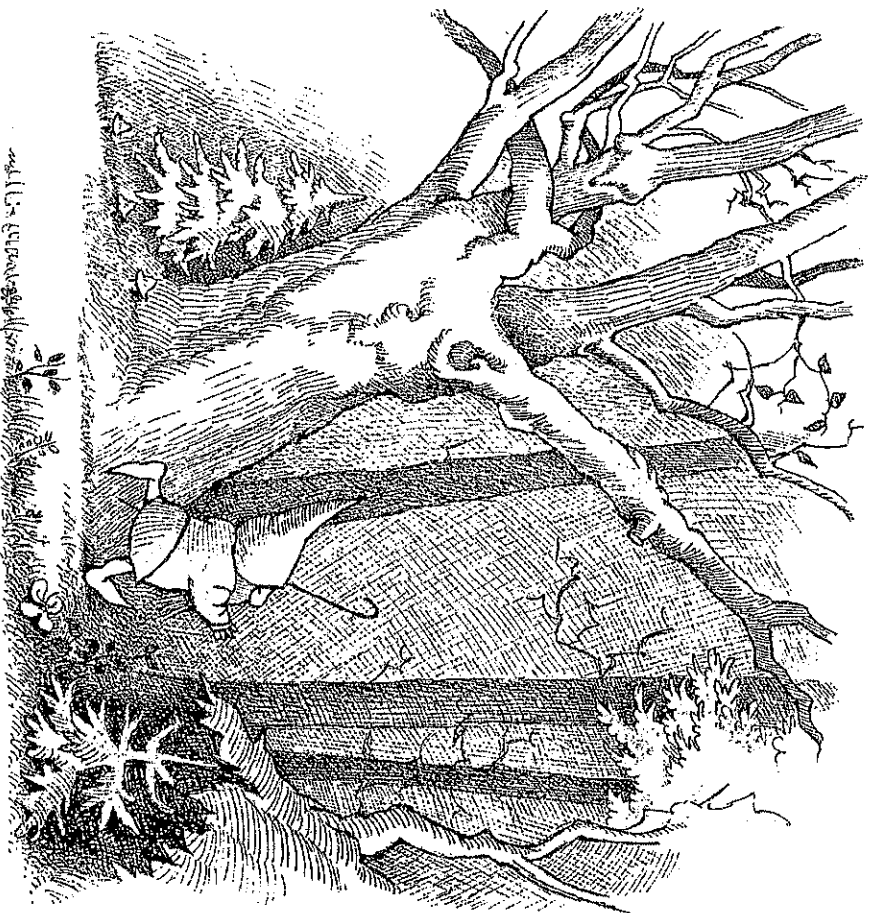

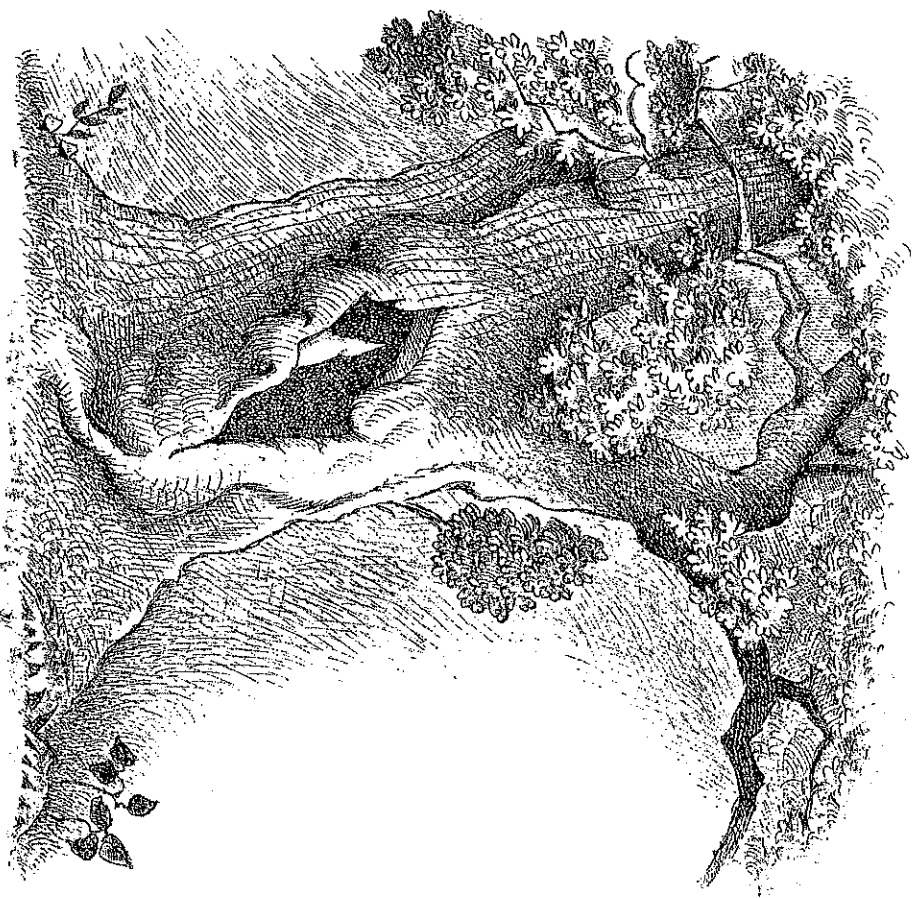
He got so scared that he jumped

pit - pat - pit - pat - pit - pat—



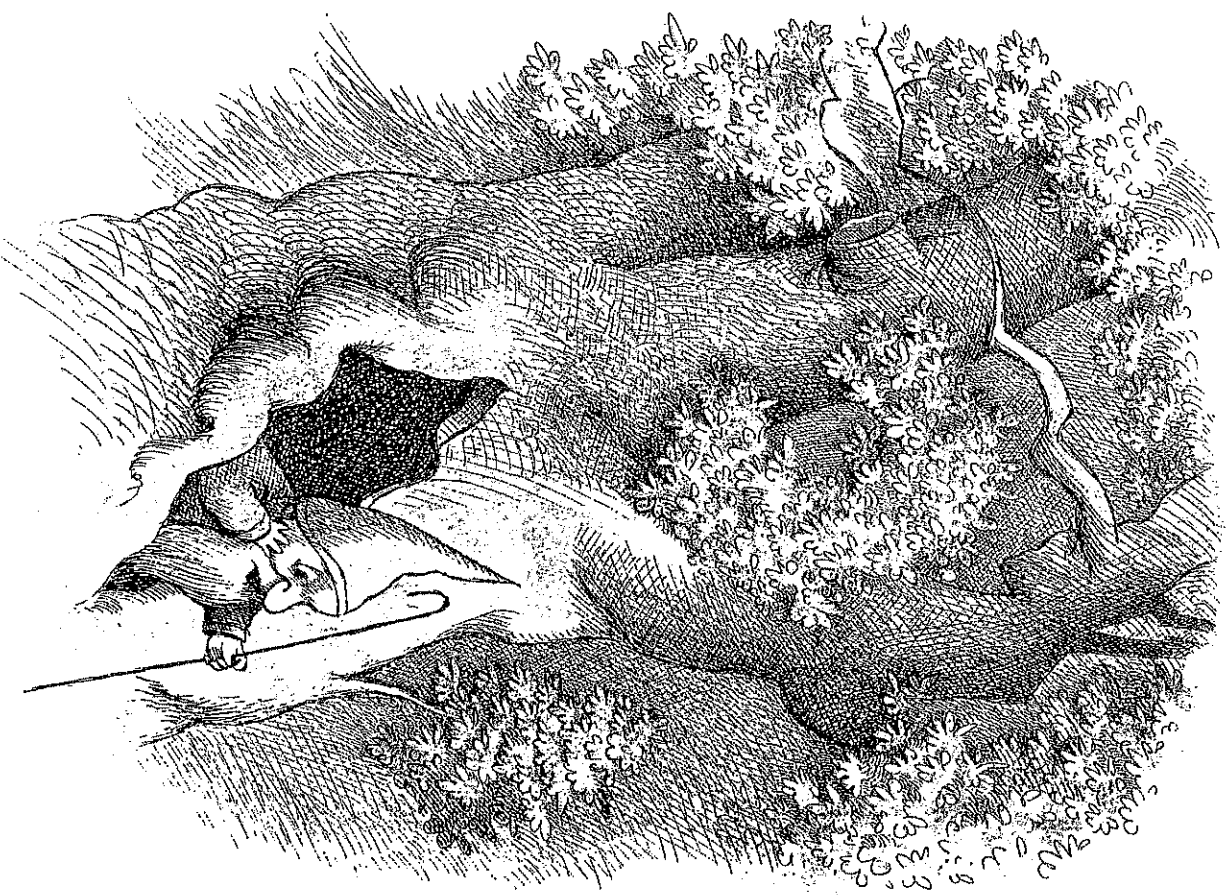
The goblin saw a hole in a tree.

right by the hole in the tree!

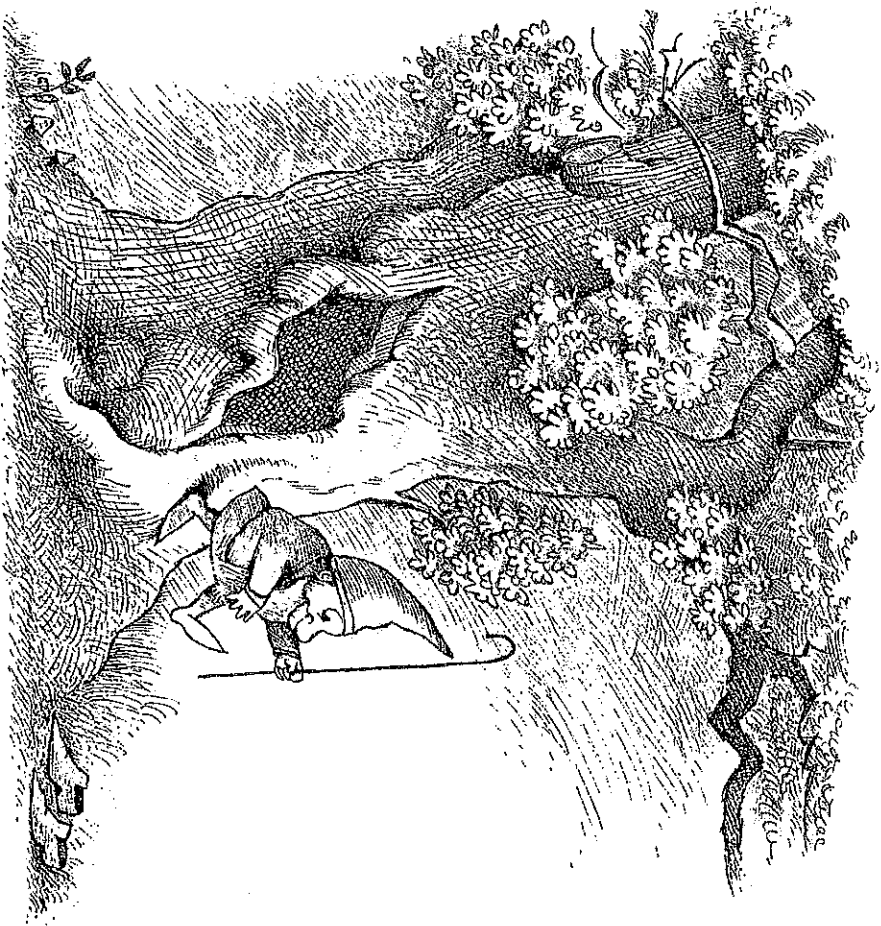
Then all was quiet.

Should he peek out?

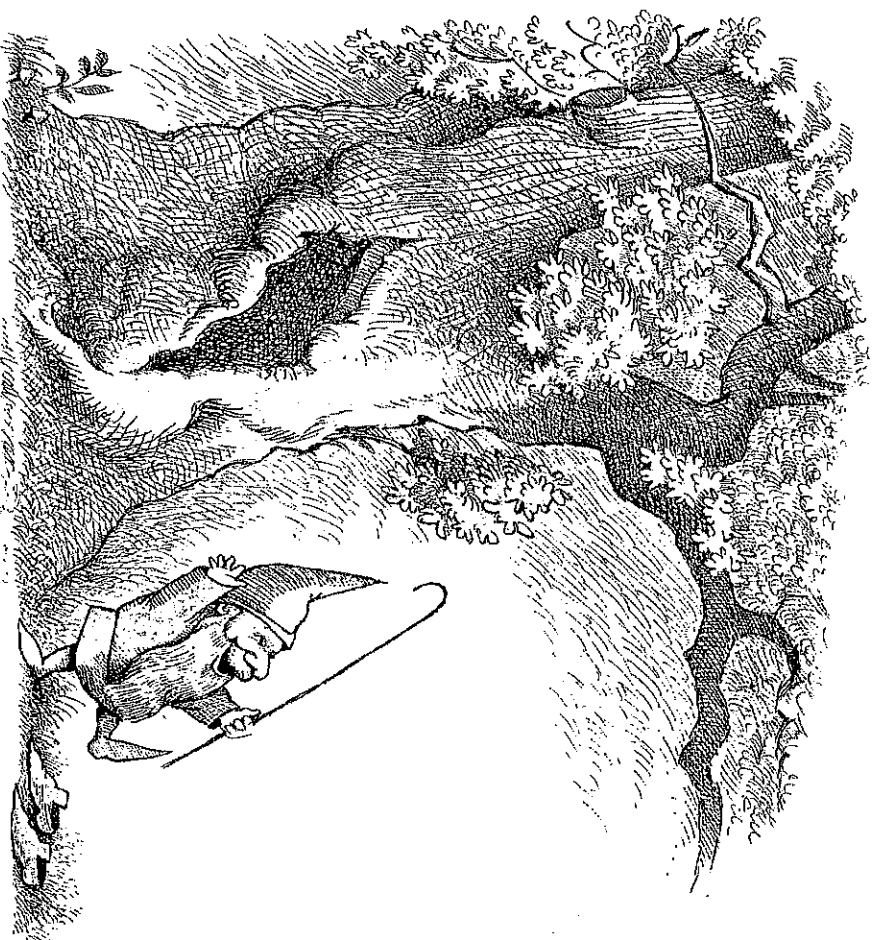
Yes, he would. He **WOULD** peek out!

Do you know what he saw?

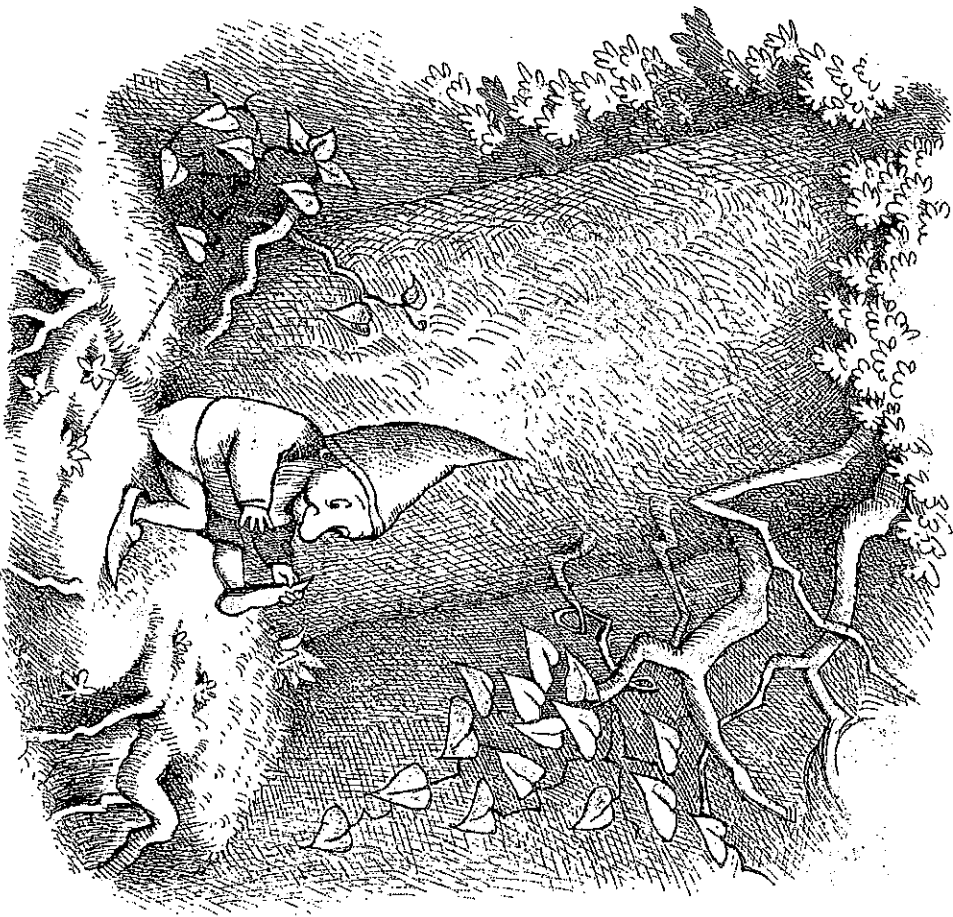




He saw— his SHOES!

And here they are!”

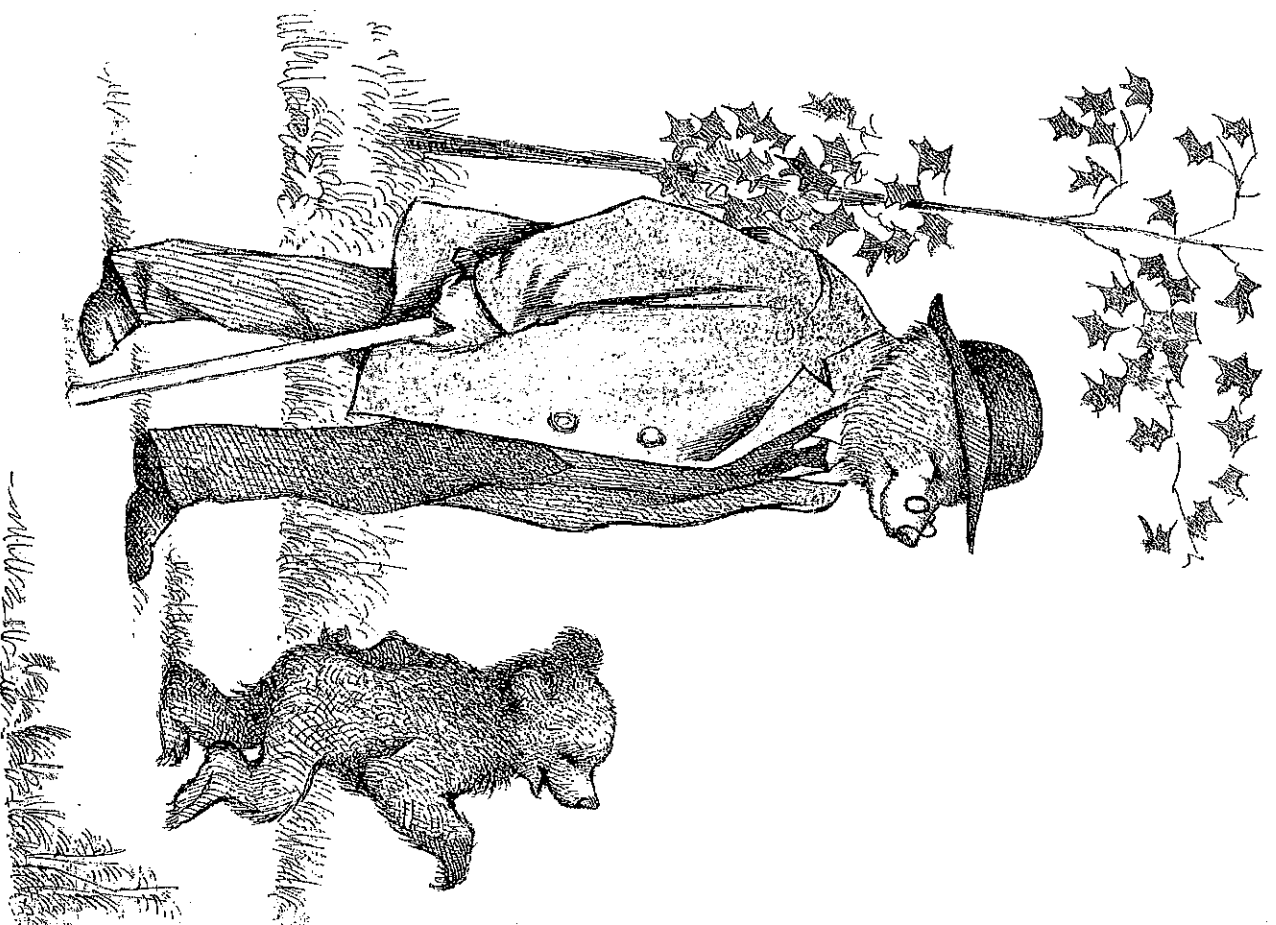


He picked up his shoes,

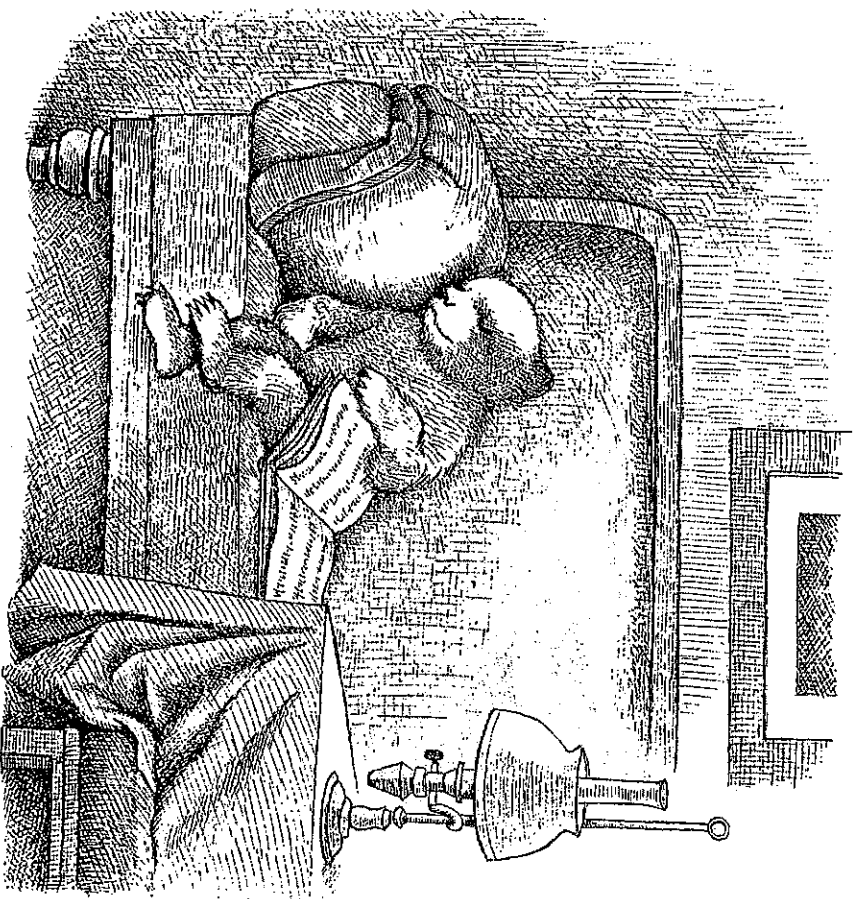
Trees

to take him home.

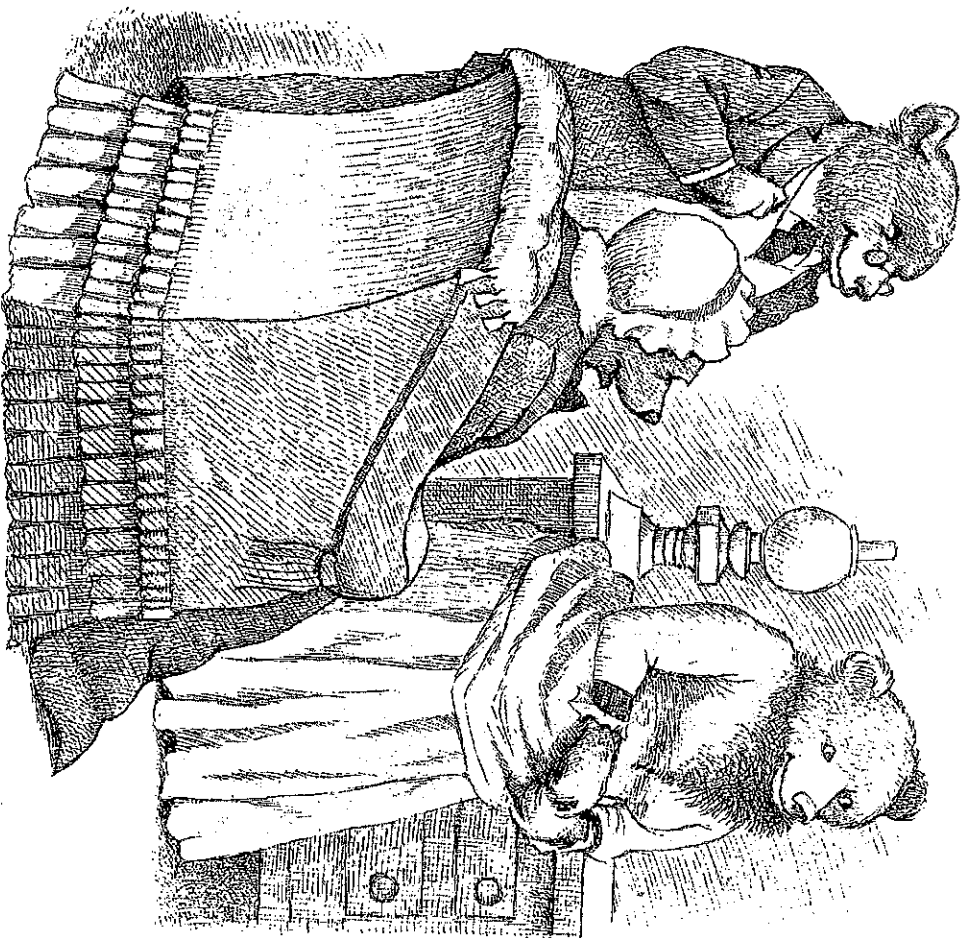
He said to himself,

He heard them come to the sofa.

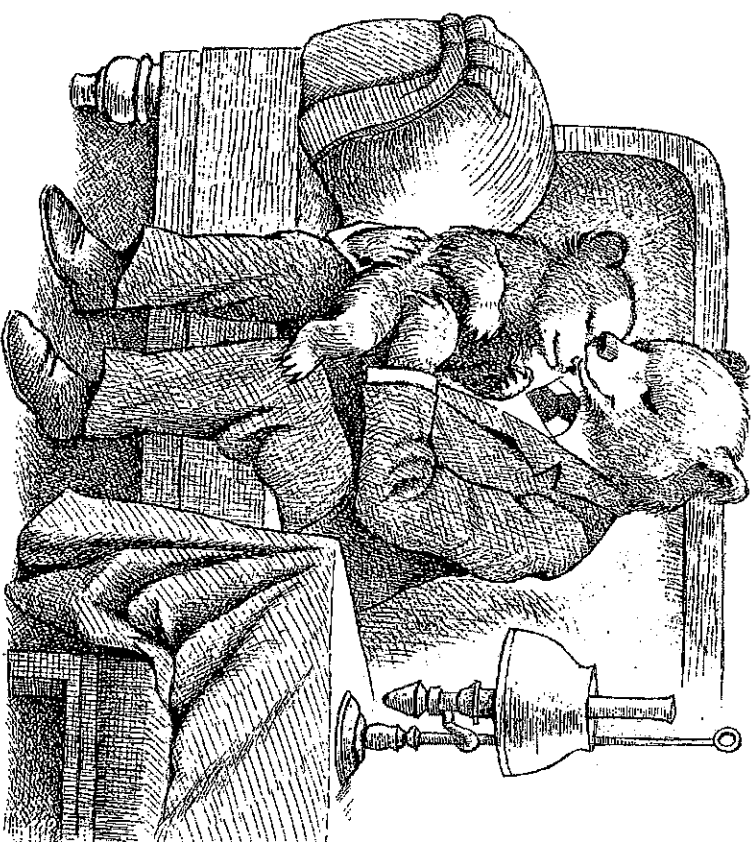
But he did not open his eyes.

How sweet he is!"



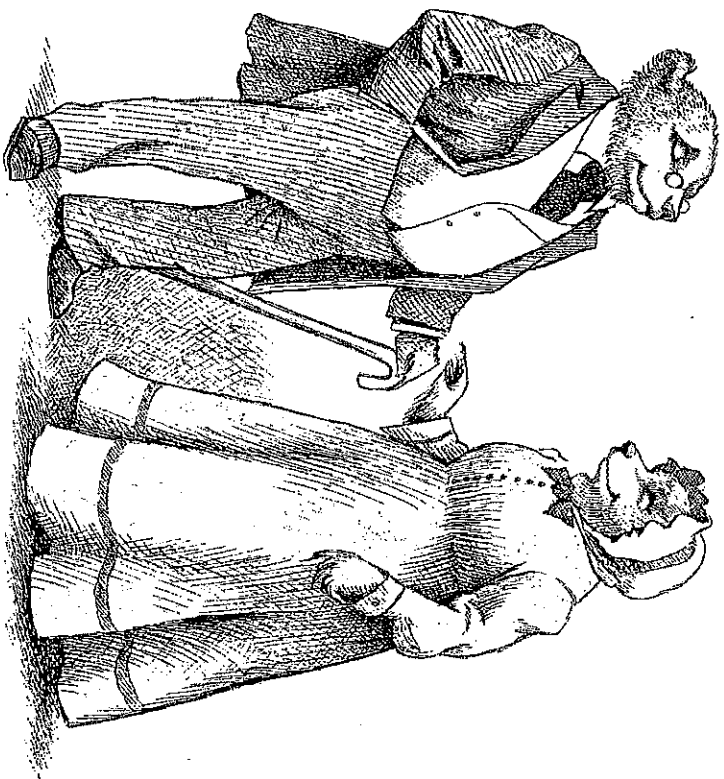
Father picked up Little Bear and said,

"And clever, too," said Grandfather.

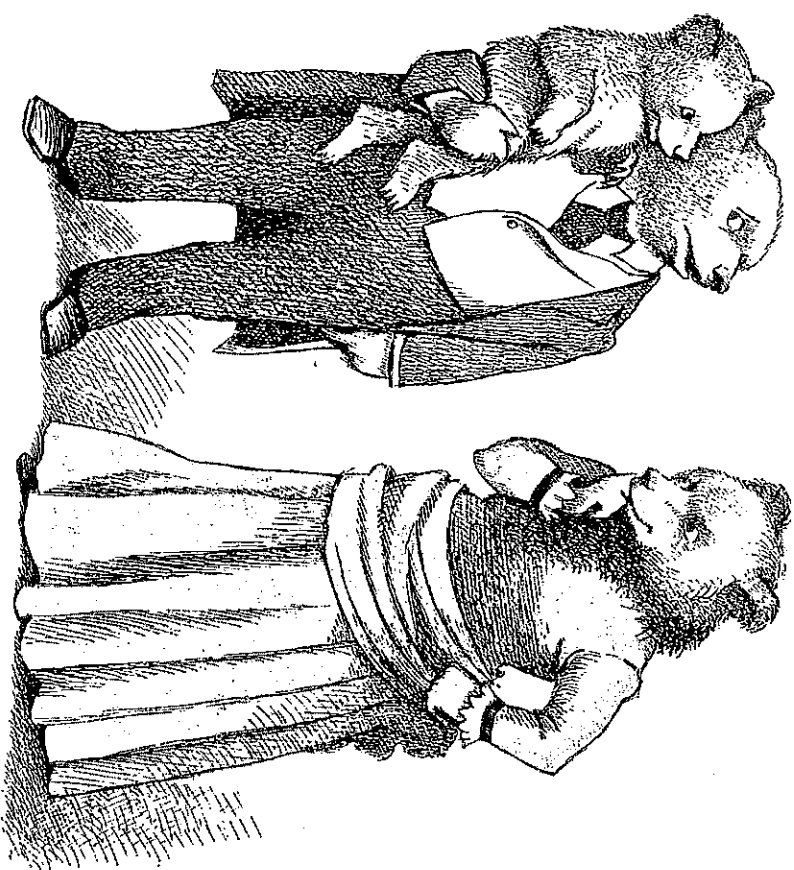
"Just like me."

But we never, never get tired!

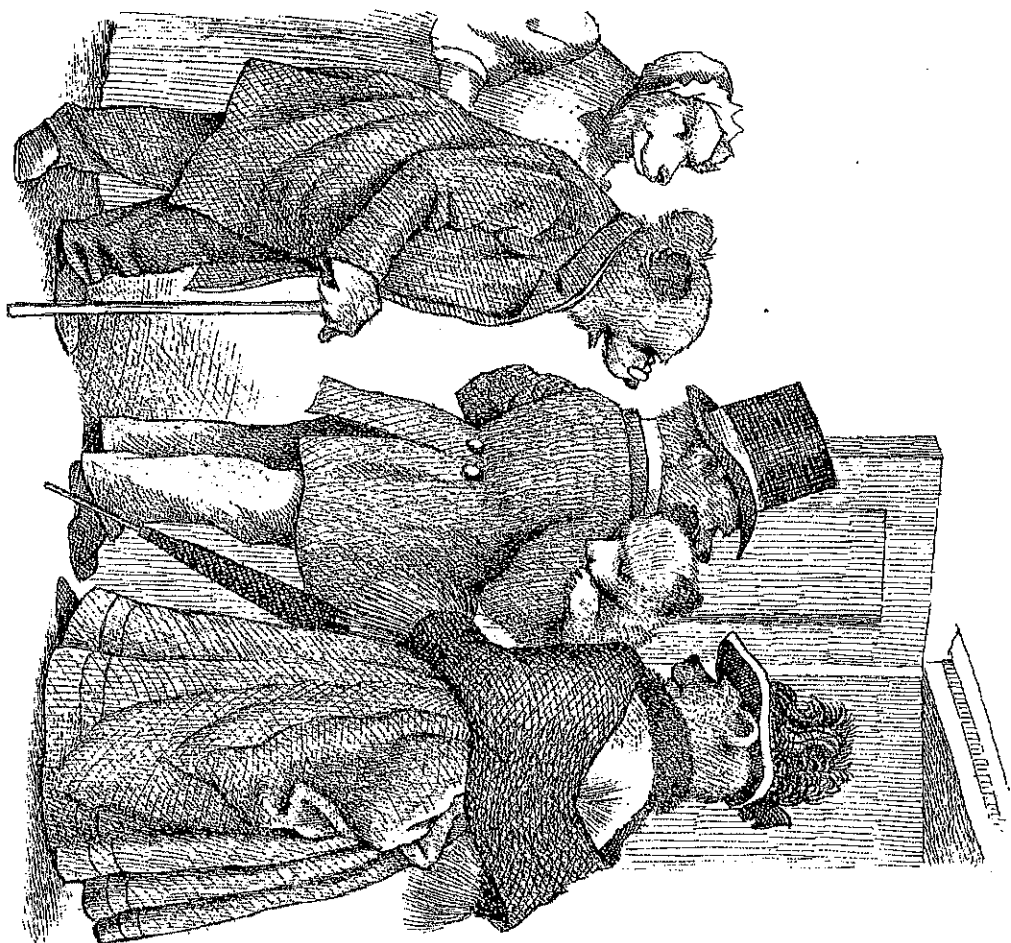
You are not tired,
